A Report on "FIGHT FOR SURVIVAL IN SOCIETY"

REPORT

The Narayana engineering college, Nellore Department of ECE conducted an awareness program on "FIGHT FOR SURVIVAL IN SOCIETY" which was organized by women's forum of the ECE department on 21-03-22 at Vishweshwaraya Auditorium, B-Block, NEC Nellore.

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The objectives of this program is that the young people especially girl child is facing so many problems big or small from childhood to adulthood and also to till death. They may face problems in the society or in the same house they are living.

3 women are raped every hour in India. The police registered 28,046 cases of rape in 2020 — an average of 77 per day. The national conviction rate for cases of rape stands at 37%, which means 2 out of 3 survivors of rape will not get justice.

For last two decades, Jan Sahas has been working on prevention of multiple forms of violence against women and girls in seven states of India. Jan Sahas believes that a fundamental change can occur only if prevention, response and rehabilitation are tackled simultaneously through a holistic approach. It's crucial to engage with men and boys to bring about behavioural change and act together as a structural driver for prevention of violence against women and girls (VAW&G).

Till date, Jan Sahas has worked with around 19,72,000 women and girls across all program areas. We are supporting 21135 survivors of sexual violence and have prevented 7,276 women from trafficking and 6,640 young girls from caste based commercial sexual exploitation of children.

Over the next 5 years, we will work to comprehensively reduce prevalence of sexual violence against women by 25% and empower 250,000 survivors, in 200 districts across India and other parts of South Asia through direct support and collaboration. Jan Sahas Helpline for Girls and Women - 1800 3000 2852 Jan Sahas runs a toll-free helpline for girls and women where they can report any form of violence. The Jan Sahas team then works with the relevant authorities to support the survivors and their families.

In this session **Dr.K.MURALI**, **HOD** of ECE addressed the gathering and introduced the resource persons, to the gathering. Later the resource persons discussed with the students about the problems faced by women in the society and how to behave as a girl child in the surrounding society

In this session the resource person, Dr.G.HADASSAH,PT(BPT) Physiotherapist shared and discussed her ideas with the students happily. Dr.G.HADASSAH,PT(BPT) garu **insisted in her speech that** girl child should be always happy to lead a successful life.

She revealed in her speech that Gender inequality still exists in India within the households, workplaces and in larger society. As per 2011 data, effective literacy rates (age 7 and above) were

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82.14% for men and 65.46% for women. In certain developing nations like India, gender inequality starts manifesting itself very early, a girl child starts facing discrimination right from the womb and it ends in <u>female foeticide</u>. Female child is treated inferior to male child and this is deeply engraved in the mind of the female child. This is more predominant in India as well as other lesser developed countries. A male child is considered a blessing and his birth is celebrated as opposed to a female child where her birth is not celebrated and is considered more of a burden. The 2011 Indian census shows that there are 940 females per 1000 boys.

She concluded her speech that Educating a boy is seen as an investment as they are expected to earn and provide for their ageing parents. Whereas, an educated girl will have a higher dowry expense because they need an educated partner. It is also believed to be a waste of resources to educate a girl child as she will eventually get married and be a homemaker. If a family cannot afford to educate all their children, the male child will get preferenceothingm."
