Every day, in every country in the world, women are confronted by discrimination and inequality. They face violence, abuse and unequal treatment at home, at work and in their wider communities – and are denied opportunities to learn, to earn and to lead.

Women form the majority of those living in They have fewer resources, less power and less influence compared to men, and can experience further inequality because of their class, ethnicity and age, as well as religious and other fundamentalism

Gender inequality is a key driver of poverty and a fundamental denial of women's rights

Gender inequality in numbers:

24% Women make up less than 24% of the worlds parliamentarians and 5% of its mayors.

24% On average Women are 24% less than men for comparable work across all regions and sectors

2/3 Nearly two thirds of the worlds 781 million illiterate adults are women,a proportion that has remained unchanged for 2 decades

153 countries have **laws which discriminate against women** economically, including 18 countries where husbands can legally prevent their wives from working

1 in 3 world wide, 1 in 3 women and girls will **experience violence or abuse** in their lifetime
